TWIGS is an intergenerational hands-on community-based educational program and curriculum that focuses on the positive development of children through integration between schools, agencies, and the community. It has been developed as a model with flexible application to a wide variety of settings and communities. It encourages involvement of community collaborators to provide additional educational enrichment for youth and provide other kinds of support to increase local sustainability.



Subject matter focus of TWIGS is gardening and nutrition. The garden is a powerful experiential educational tool that can connect children with science, nutrition, ecological responsibility and community beautification, cultural diversity, appreciation of other generations, and provides opportunities for easy integration of reading, writing, math, social studies, art, and other subjects.

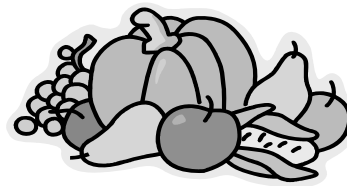
The Curriculum:

This 125 page curriculum package includes 30 field tested lessons connecting gardening with nutrition for children in Kindergarten through sixth grade. The focus is on positively influencing participant's nutritive choices through the development and harvesting of a vegetable garden.

Lessons are flexible, meant to be selected based on interests, timing of project, and available materials. Nearly all lessons include a Handout suitable for reproducing. Many original illustrations are included.

Intended Users:

This curriculum is written for parents, after-school day care providers, summer day-camp staff, youth agency staff, kindergarten teachers, elementary school teachers, and non-formal youth development organizations to use with children.

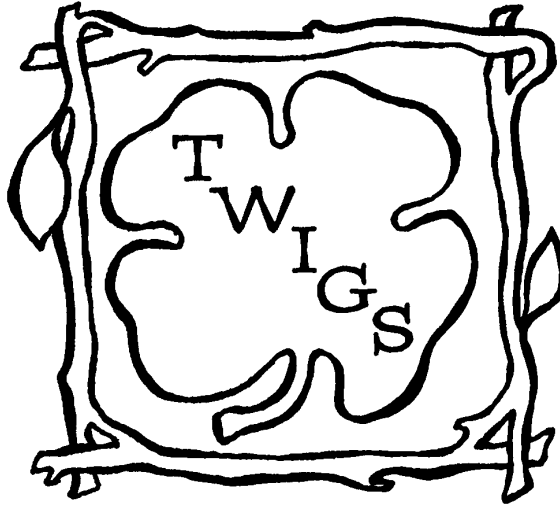
